# Midlands Sailing School Learn to Sail Level 1



The Learn to Sail program took place on the 16th and 17th of March 2024. Fourteen participants from Durban University of Technology attended and successfully completed a Learn to Sail Level 1

program. During the course, they were introduced to the fundamentals of sailing and gained a basic understanding of sailing techniques. The program aimed to provide participants with a solid foundation in sailing, preparing them for further exploration and skill development in the sport.

### **Main Activities**

- Participants engaged in theoretical sessions on sailing principles and learned the importance of fitting buoyancy aids for safety while on water.
- Practical activities included hands-on experience in floating techniques and rigging boats.
- Participants had the opportunity to sail with experienced Instructors, practicing manoeuvres such as tacking and gaining confidence on the water.
- Learning sessions focused on identifying different parts of a boat, mastering knot-tying skills, and understanding how to read and utilize wind direction effectively.
- Participants demonstrated their ability to helm a boat, showcasing proficiency in basic controls and ultimately sailed independently under supervision.

### Outcome:

The Learn to Sail program proved to be a resounding success, with participants making significant strides in their understanding and application of sailing fundamentals. By the end of the two-day program, participants were able to confidently helm a boat, execute basic manoeuvres, and sail independently. They showed strong knowledge of boat parts, knot-tying techniques, and the importance of wind direction in sailing.
